



PEACEWISEYOUTH Course 6

Scope and Sequence

1. Basic Course structure and licence period

Course 6 of PeaceWiseYouth (for **Years 9-10**) contains **three modules of five, six and four topics each respectively** (15 in total).

- Each topic needs around 40 or more minutes to complete.
- The course is designed to be completed *sequentially*.
- Purchasing a PeaceWiseKids and PeaceWiseYouth Course gives the right to use the material for 12 months. For longer periods, a further purchase is needed.

2. Presentation alternatives and implications for teaching

There are two alternative ways of using Course 6: Premium Online and Group Presentation. Both include stimulus videos and supported lesson plans for each topic.

The broad selection of activities in the lesson plans means that you can use the content in either of the following ways:

a) If you want to teach the content over *two different calendar years*:

- The class uses the initial content in Year 9, then include the additional consolidation activity when the same youth move into Year 10 the following year.
- In this case you CAN still do this within a 12-month period (e.g. last two terms of Year 9, first two terms of Year 10), in which case you will only need ONE licence per child/teacher. You only need a second licence if the total period you are teaching the course goes for more than 12 months.

b) If you want to teach the content over *a single calendar year* (either Year 9 or Year 10):

- Include the additional consolidation activities if time permits to further develop the student’s understanding of peacemaking.

3. Course philosophy and intent

PeaceWiseYouth is more than just a programme to help youth learn topic-specific conflict management skills.

It is a comprehensive course, mapped to the Australian curriculum, that is intended to:

- give youth deep and broad relational skills that they can use for the rest of their lives
- inspire youth to want to be people who actively breathe grace and peace into the communities they belong to (i.e. make a difference beyond simply their own personal relationships); and
- help build a healthy relational culture of peace within the community where it is taught (school, church, family etc).

This, then, is how PeaceWiseYouth works:

- Module 1 (Understanding conflict) is the core concepts and framework
- Module 2 (Responding to conflict) is learning the skills
- Module 3 (Peacemakers for life) is the embedding part

Modules are self-contained and follow a pivotal sequential order. It is designed to be taught from beginning to end and is not conducive to picking and choosing what to do and what to leave out. This is essential if students are to fully engage in the content and fully grow in their understanding of peacemaking.

For students to learn the range of principles and skills that will impact them at a deeper level, teachers are encouraged to plan to teach as much of the overall course content as possible.

4. Scope and sequence

The course can be executed in a variety of ways. Whichever option is chosen, we recommend ongoing reinforcement of the content by encouraging the youth to apply the principles in their lives and relationships, and, most importantly, constant use of the *language* of PeaceWiseYouth so that the concepts become embedded.

Note: The Premium Online licenses per student include up to 15 minutes more content, which can be interwoven into in class activities, or students may complete these activities independently during class or another time.

Here are four possible options to choose from, based on your needs or wants:

- Teach the course over four terms – 3 or 4 topics per term
- Teach the course over three terms – one module per term
- Teach the course over two terms – 7 or 8 topics per term
- Teach the course over a single term – 2 topics per week

The consolidation activities have been provided in the instance that students are engaging with the content a second time, for example, having been through the course in Year 9, they are revising the content again in Year 10.

5. Building a culture of peace in your community – a final word

PeaceWiseKids/PeaceWiseYouth courses are character growth resources. The potential to impact behaviour and build cultures of peace is increased by committing to the time and exposure required for the students to deeply engage with the concepts and principles and apply them in their lives.

If the school or other learning community is genuinely committed to seeking to build a culture of peace using this course, there is no “short cut” or “cut and paste” approach alternative to teaching the full course – just like there is no “short cut” to learning to drive.

This is why it is necessary to teach the course from beginning to end. It is not designed for topics to be

taught stand-alone (for example, picking out the forgiveness topics in Module 2 without doing the groundwork of the peacemaking framework in the four topics of Module 1).

Additionally, culture change is heavily dependent on how effectively a school, college, church, family or other community embeds the principles and strategies of peacemaking throughout the organisation or community.

APPENDIX 1

DETAILED SCOPE AND SEQUENCE

PART ONE: OPTIONS USING THE PREMIUM ONLINE COURSE

Here are four possible options to choose from, based on your needs or wants:

- Teach the course over four terms – 3 or 4 topics per term
- Teach the course over three terms – one module of 5 topics per term
- Teach the course over two terms – 7 or 8 topics per term
- Teach the course over a single term – 2 topics per week

We will illustrate two of these options below, in each case assuming you will use content over the course of **Year 9 and 10** with the students – in other words they will engage students with the content over TWO learning years.

If you wish to use other options, simply adjust the frequency of classes devoted to teaching the material.

Whichever option is chosen, we recommend ongoing reinforcement of the content through encouraging the youth to apply the principles in their lives and relationships, and, most importantly, constant use of the *language* of PeaceWiseYouth so that the concepts become embedded.

Note that it is *possible* (though probably not our recommended approach) to teach the course intensively in a camp situation teaching multiple topics per day, although it's a lot to take in this way:

YEAR 9 – TEACH THE FOUNDATION YEAR	
Here we assume that the initial activities in the Lessons Plans will be used for Year 9.

YEAR 10 – TEACH THE CONSOLIDATION YEAR

In this example, we assume that you have taught using the foundation year in the Lessons Plans for Year 9, and now the consolidation activity in the Lesson Plans will be considered when those students are in Year 10.

It is recommended students repeat the online content and complete any foundation activities they may have missed.

PART TWO: OPTIONS USING THE PRESENTATION COURSE

As with the Premium Course, the Presentation Course is designed to be taught sequentially, one lesson per sitting until complete. You could:

- Teach the course over two terms – 7 or 8 topics per term – within a single year
 - *e.g. teach to a mixed Youth Group with Year 9 and 10 youth*
- Teach the course over two terms – 7 or 8 topics per term – crossing from one year to the next
 - *e.g. teach to a Year 9 group in Term 4 in one year and Term 1 in the next year when they're in Year 10*

If you wish to use other options, simply adjust the frequency and timing of classes devoted to teaching the material.

Note that it is *possible* (though probably not our recommended approach) to teach the course intensively in a camp situation introducing multiple topics per day, although it's a lot to take in this way.

Licence considerations:

In our example below, we assume all the teaching will happen within a 12 month period. If you need to teach over more than 12 months, you will need to make a second purchase.

TEACHING THE PRESENTATION COURSE OVER TWO TERMS

Complete the first 8 topics, one topic a week.

THE SECOND TERM YOU TEACH IT

Complete the next 7 topics, one topic a week.
